# The Democratic Party serves the people



Diego Rivera's op-ed on Dec. 22, "How the Democratic Party (blame Bernie) flunked the election," was meant to be a broadside against the Democratic Party, but remarkably the author only demonstrated how vulnerable and insecure the Republican Party has become. We are only a few weeks away from inauguration, yet Republicans can only talk about attacking Democrats. Why is this? Well, let's do a quick fact check:

Hilary Clinton won the national vote by 2.9 million people. Here in Pima County, we had a massive volunteer turnout, and she won by double digits. This margin of victory outstripped those of the last two presidential cycles. Without the

outdated, historical, leftover electoral college, Trump would be back in New York right now (likely tweeting angrily at the latest episode of "Gilmore Girls") instead of in D.C. (tweeting angrily at "Saturday Night Live"). Republicans know how close they are to losing the slim plurality of voters that supported them, and they will continue these desperate attacks to distract us from their precarious position.

Democrats are not fragile, nor are we defenseless. Our primary was competitive — all good political races should be — but both sides unified in support of a progressive agenda.
