Let's Talk Fiscal Responsibility!

It's about getting what we pay for, and we haven't been.

The longer the austerity charade by the Legislature goes on, the more comes out about how the past eight budgets passed by the Legislature have given away our tax dollars.

First, we all know that the Highway User Revenue Funds (HURF) were "swept" (a euphemism for robbed) during the recession. However, that recession has been over for several years now, and yet, the Legislature has only restored 60 percent of them to most of the counties in Arizona. If you think Thornydale is bad (and it is), you should go up to Mammoth on Hwy 77!

In Pinal County, we're being asked to vote on two propositions to fund highway maintenance and construction but "I already paid for those roads with my gas taxes and other fees that are being spent on 'trickle down' magic that never worked."

Did you know that while the Legislature was taking school funding away to offset the 1 cent sales tax we voted to give public schools, it was also taking money out of the Public Safety Personnel Retirement Fund? That one didn't make as big of a splash in the papers, but it was there. Our firefighters and peace officers were deprived of \$400 million from their retirement fund!

A couple of weeks ago, another historical transgression was revealed by the *AZ Capitol Times*. Gov. Brewer began, and Gov. Ducey continued, taking funds, almost \$275 million, out of the state employees' Health Insurance Trust Fund--their health care insurance pool of monies. Now, the state told employees they were going to have to pay a higher premium for their health insurance because the fund needs to be recharged. Where did those hard-earned dollars go, that were supposed to be available for employees' health care costs?

That's the real rub. Arizona has an annual budget of approximately \$9 billion, yet our Legislature has more than \$13 billion in tax giveaways to corporations, with no expiration date on them! Some of those "loopholes" are really old, and we aren't getting our return on investment anymore. Let's investigate that! Let's take some of these companies off their gravy train and start demanding we get what we pay for!

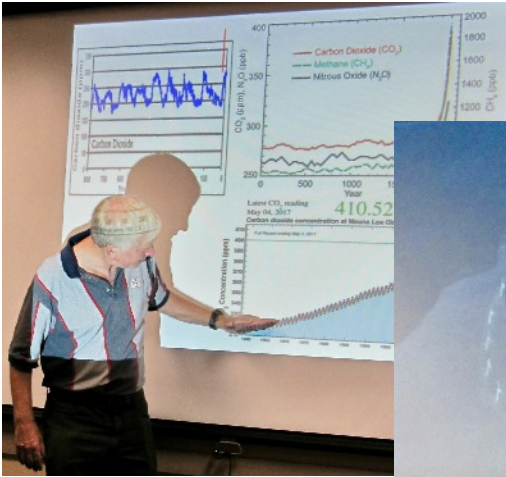
