Why Not Confiscate Federal Lands?

The LD 11 GOP candidates for Arizona Legislature say that they want to fund all the shortfalls they've created, by taking control of Federal lands in Arizona and collecting revenue that now goes to the Federal government.

Q. What could go wrong?!

A1. The Federal Government sends money to Arizona counties. "Payments in Lieu of Taxes" equals \$39.8 million per year. Those funds, that go straight to the counties, would no longer be available to them.

A2. As recently as 2012, voters sent a resounding "No" signal to the idea, by voting down Prop 120 by 68%. Arizonans are worried that they'll lose access to these lands, and it would likely hurt our economy. Outdoor recreation accounts for \$10.6 billion in consumer spending in AZ annually.

A3. It would be expensive! Governor Jan Brewer, a Republican, vetoed a major "land takeover" bill partly due to concerns over the economic "uncertainty" it would create. She said that the Arizona State Land Department would need an extra \$23 million for general management costs as well as "an untold increase in staff and resources."

Governor Doug Ducey vetoed two bills that asked the federal government to turn over public lands to the state, but he did sign into law a measure to spend taxpayer dollars studying the idea further. We should wait for those results.

A4. *Wildfire* prevention is often cited as a reason to seize lands and take a more pro-active approach to managing them while reaping profits through thinning the forests. Sounds good, right? Turns out, there is a lot of controversy surrounding the concept of forest thinning preventing wildfires. As for fighting those wildfires, Arizona budgets \$5M - \$10M per year, and one large wildfire easily costs over \$100M to overcome. The 2011 Wallow Fire, in eastern Arizona cost \$109 million in suppression and initial rehabilitation of the land alone. A serious fire season could decimate Arizona's coffers.

In the end, Arizona would be taking on a huge liability with a questionable probability of any benefits or profits. We would likely be better served working more closely with the Department of the Interior to ensure we receive our due, and they manage Arizona lands well. Meanwhile, we, and our posterity, can enjoy them and the secondary income they generate throughout the State.
