Tom O'Halleran CD1 U.S. Congressman



Background: Tom has never forgotten the sacrifices his parents made during the Depression to provide for him and his siblings. It's their work ethic and compassion that has made him a committed public servant. As Tom was growing up, his parents urged him to study hard and serve the community through the Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts.

Career: In 1966, at 20 years old, he joined the Chicago Police Department, where he was an officer and then a sergeant in a special operations unit. Tom was later commissioned to be one of the youngest homicide investigators in the city's history. In 1979, Tom became a member of the Chicago Board of Trade, where he opened up his own business and served two terms on the board of directors. He served as chair or vice-chair of the Exchange's finance, floor operations, and planning committees. In 1994, Tom became a consultant on design and integration of technology for financial trading floors. Upon retirement, Tom and his wife Pat moved to Arizona, where he became involved in local issues, first as an advocate for Yavapai County, and the cities and towns of the Verde Valley, focusing on natural resources and education issues. He then took up the call for new leadership in the state legislature and was elected to the Arizona House of Representatives with broad support. He served three consecutive terms as a State Representative followed by a term as a State Senator. While serving in the legislature, Tom received over 40 awards for his distinguished service. Now as a U.S. Congressman, Tom is a leader on issues impacting Indian Country and rural America, and he is focused on economic development opportunities across Arizona.

A Kochtopus Tentacle Regrows

Using typical Koch code words and phrases such as "stand against socialism", "economic freedom", "competitive market place" and "free markets", Sean Noble, the Koch acolyte and political operative from Show Low, is now campaigning against laws that limit annual interest rate caps. You will remember him from the Center to Protect Patient Rights that aggressively fought Obamacare and from the FAIR Trust that harassed and sued our Independent Redistricting Commission. It's odd to mount a campaign in favor of loan sharking but he seems to have a paying client, the National Credit Alliance. The campaign will be ironically named Arizonans for Financial Freedom. As usual the freedom is from regulation for the rich.

Recently our family experienced a \$3,000 emergency. This would have devastated a minimum wage worker whose take home pay at \$15 per hour after taxes and health insurance is \$1823. Average monthly costs in Arizona for running a household are: \$936 for 2 bedroom apartment rent, \$128 for utilities, \$644 for food, and \$48 for a bus pass. When subtracted this leaves \$67 for clothes, phones, cable, school fees, other transportation, etc. This scenario shows the plight of the working poor. There is no way to save for emergencies and no ability to make any monthly payment on a \$3,000 loan; particularly at the current maximum rate of 36% with a payment of \$301.39 per month.

We can expect support for the campaign from our LD11 representatives, Finchem and Leach. Leach in particular already has a friendly relationship with Noble, since they both fought the Redistricting Commission in court.

Get you sharp tongues ready. We have another battle to wage against the Kochtopus.
