Brian Johnson, Candidate for Pima County Treasurer

Brian Johnson is a 25-year resident of Pima County who resides in the community of Picture Rocks. He is a life-long Democrat, having cast his first vote for President for Jimmy Carter in 1976. 



Michael Byran, founder of BlogForArizona

Thank you for your continued support and membership as DOV celebrates 20 years of service to our Democrat community.


Let's work together to win our upcoming 2024 election and save our democracy.

Our Legislature in Review

A summary of our 2024 legislative session's first month with 8,400 bills introduced demonstrates how overwhelming and impossible bills are to follow. Two of the most disturbing developments are the proposed 107 SCR and HCR bills. If passed, these bills bypass the Governor and go directly to the voters. If even a small portion of those bills pass, our 2024 ballot will be overwhelming for voters. And voters will either decide to not vote on the measures or vote 'no' on all of them. The Arizona Abortion Access initiative that we have been petitioning for so diligently could become a fatality.

This past week Civic Engagement Beyond Voting (CEBV) reviewed 108 bills and recommended Request to Speak (RTS) positions on all of them. Of those, 30 were advanced by Democrats with only 5 getting assigned to a committee which is another form of Republican sabotage.

Health & Safety

- FAA grounded Boeing 737 Max planes after an Alaska Airlines jetliner experienced a blowout of a fuselage panel and required immediate inspections of Max 9 planes, affecting 171 planes worldwide.
- TSA seized more guns than ever before at security checkpoints in 2023; the vast majority were loaded.
- Biden launches an advertising campaign supporting women's reproductive rights by focusing on how abortion restrictions have affected women and health care providers.
- Biden convened his reproductive health care access task force to discuss threats to emergency care for women and new steps for implementing executive orders on the subject.
- CDC issued a report warning about cosmetic surgeries in the Dominican Republic where 93 Americans have died since 2009 and cautioned medical tourists to research facilities carefully before traveling abroad.
- Biden administration proposed new regulations on meat and poultry processing plants to reduce pollution of nearby rivers and streams.

Economy

- Federal Reserve is confident inflation will continue falling to the Reserve's 2% target level, noting that with inflation slowing even as growth and hiring remain solid, the combination is as good as it gets.
- Commerce Department announced consumer spending, which accounts for 70% of the US economy doubled in December.
- WH announced a proposal to limit overdraft fees to as little as \$3 to ease the burden on consumers living paycheck to paycheck with some banks charging up to \$39 each, totaling \$8 billion in fines per year.
- Biden announced \$82 million to help connect 16,000 new households and businesses in North Carolina to high-speed internet along with other infrastructure investments that have already resulted in good paying jobs.
- US job market remains strong with 9 million new job openings in December, up from November's job listings, and consumer confidence rose for a third straight month.

Environment & Climate Change

- Biden announced \$623 million in grants to fund EV charging stations and 7,500 EV ports across the nation.
- Biden administration announced a new rule fining oil and natural gas companies for methane emissions that exceed prescribed levels.
- Energy Department announced \$104 million in grants for projects at 31 government sites to boost carbon-free electricity at federal facilities, including solar panels at the Pentagon.
- EPA announced Biden's Clean School Bus Grants will fund 2,700 electric buses serving over 7 million students in 37 states, including Arizona in 280 school districts, including TUSD and Flowing Wells.

Justice

• DOJ has charged more than 1,230 people with federal crimes in the January 6th riot; 900 have been convicted with prison sentences totaling 840 years.

- DOJ announced Biden's Gun Safety Law, the most sweeping gun legislation in decades requiring extra checks for those under 21, has prevented more than 500 youths from obtaining firearms.
- DOJ report identified an array of failures in response to the Uvalde elementary school massacre, citing training, communication, leadership, technology problems and a failure to follow accepted practices.

Social Justice

• Biden administration has begun cancelling student loan debt ahead of schedule to provide faster relief for those who have made payments for at least 10 years.

Immigration and Border Security

- US officials announced Mexico's leadership agreed to help slow the high volume of migrant arrivals.
- Biden's new 'safe mobility offices' in Colombia, Guatemala, Costa Rica, and Ecuador are designed to streamline the refugee process; so far 9,000 refugees have been approved for entry through the program.
- CBP installed a large, heated tent to shelter up to 1,000 asylum seekers awaiting processing in response to Tohono O'odham Nation's environmental damage and humanitarian concerns at San Miguel Gate.
- Biden lobbies Congress for a deal on border security that maintains his authority that has been in effect since the 1950's to grant migrants humanitarian parole during emergencies and global unrest.
- FEMA granted Pima County an additional \$5.2 million to continue its work aiding asylum seekers who need medical care to stop the spread of Covid.

Technology and Cybersecurity

• US officials disrupted a Chinese-backed effort to plant malware that could be used to damage civilian infrastructure should the US and China ever go to war.

Government

- Biden signed a short-term spending bill to keep the federal government operating until early March.
- Federal transportation department announced a \$95 million grant to widen I-10 between Chander and Casa Grande plus the removal and replacement of bridges over the Gila River.
- WH laid out new guidelines for Cabinet agencies to follow when there is a transfer of authority that occurs due to medical issues, travel, or other occurrences.
- IRS launches a Direct File pilot program in 12 states that will allow eligible filers to calculate and submit their returns to the government directly without using commercial tax preparation software.

International Relations:

- Defense Department announced a US airstrike killed the leader of Iran-backed militia responsible for the attacks on American personnel in Baghdad.
- US designated the Houthis as global terrorists and invoked financial sanctions against them that minimize the amount of harm to Yemen's 32 million people who are among world's poorest.
- US fighter jets struck Houthi rebel sites for the sixth time, taking out anti-ship missile launchers in Yemen to stop the militants' harassment of vessels in the Red Sea that have disrupted global shipping.
- US and British militaries and other allied nations launched new retaliatory strikes on eight Houthi storage and missile sites in order to defend lives and the flow of commerce in one of the world's critical waterways.
- US national security advisors met with China's Foreign Minister who agreed to use their country's influence with Iran to help ease tensions in the Middle East.

- Biden met with Germany's Chancellor to discuss new aid for Ukraine and Israel while his US foreign aid package remains stalled in Congress.
- US and Iraq held their first formal talks aimed at winding down the US-led coalition formed to fight the Islamic State group in Iraq.

International Relations: Israel

- Secretary of State went to the Middle East for the fourth time in three months to ease fears that the Israel-Hamas war could erupt into a broader conflict.
- Secretary of State announced Saudi Arabia, Jordan, Qatar, United Arab Emirates and Turkey agreed to begin planning for the reconstruction and governance of Gaza once the war ends.
- WH National Security Council again asked Israel to scale back its military offensive in Gaza by transitioning to low-intensity operations.
- Secretary of State Blinken noted Israel cannot achieve security without a pathway to a Palestinian state, insisting such a move would help unify the Middle East and isolate Israel's top rival Iran.
- US and key Hamas mediators announced a framework for a cease-fire and hostage release was reached.
- Biden issued an executive order targeting Israeli settlers in the West Bank who attacked Palestinians and Israeli peace activists by imposing financial sanctions and visa bans on them.
- US military launched an attack on 85 command headquarters, intelligence centers, and drone and missile storage sites in response to the Iranian-backed drone strike that killed US troops in Jordan.
- US and UK mounted a second wave of assaults, striking 36 Houthi targets in Yemen to further disable their attacks on American and international interests amid the Israel-Hamas war.
- US Secretary of State returned to the Middle East on his fifth urgent diplomatic mission since Israel's war with Hamas began.

International Relations: Ukraine

• Biden convened congressional leaders to underscore security needs related to Ukraine, Israel, and other US allies that could unlock \$110 billion in aid that Congress has tied to a landmark immigration deal.
